St Mary Crowned Restoration

Fr Martin writes,

Good news! After five years of hard work and meticulous planning by the Glossop Parishes Maintenance Committee, and generous fundraising by parishioners, the plan that Fr Greg began five years ago to repair and improve the interior of St Mary Crowned is soon to turn into action. Plans have been drawn up, tenders have been received, and the project has been approved by the Historic Churches Committee, who have granted a faculty for the work to begin. It has been approved by the Diocesan Buildings and Sites Committee, and has gained permission from the Diocesan Trustees. Since there is not enough money to do all the work at once, it will be done in two stages, and the first stage, of repairing and redecorating, may now begin as soon as the chosen contractors are ready to start.

Further news will follow later, but for now, let's breathe a sigh of relief, thank God, and thank the people who have worked with such determination to save St Mary's.

This Sunday's Mass Readings are: Wisdom 6: 12-16; Psalm 62: 2-8; 1 Thess 4: 13-18; Mt 25: 1-13

Thoughts from today's Gospel Reading: Matthew 25: 1-13

Only Matthew tells this parable (though Luke 12:35-38 gives the same teaching). It follows on from the parable of the good steward who faithfully looks after the master's affairs during his absence, in contrast to the servant who takes advantage of the master's absence and too late realises the return is upon him. The bridesmaids show a similar contrast. All are invited to the wedding, just as both the servants were trusted. Bridesmaids are invited to provide ceremony with lighted lamps for the wedding processions and reception. They are not there for themselves but to give honour to the bridegroom and bride. The shortage of oil is the responsibility of the foolish bridesmaids. They must atone by going to buy oil for themselves, but fear being late back - so they ask for a share of the wise virgins' oil instead. Justifiably, the request is refused. It is common sense that oil sufficient for five lamps would not be sufficient for ten, and the wedding reception would have been ruined.

Everyday life is full of scroungers preying on the kindness or embarrassment of others. Provide for yourselves responsibly, says the parable. Be wise, not foolish and wasteful. Prepare for the coming of the Lord by always being ready.
