Thoughts from today's Gospel Reading: Mark 4: 26-34

Mark's chapter 4 is one of parables.

It opens with the parable of the sower, Jesus' explaining to the apostles why he speaks in parables, an explanation of the sower parable and then more - the lamp and the measure - before coming to today's reading.

Only Mark tells the story of the seed growing secretly.

The teaching is clear:

The kingdom is a divine act, not a human accomplishment. The steady hidden growth in the soil has to be watched for but cannot be forced.

This is beautiful.

The gardener or farmer prepares the soil but the yield is intrinsic to the seed not to the soil. The kingdom is not political or social, nor even religious –

It is spiritual, of God, and only God can know the true life of the seed (the Spirit).

The mustard seed parable is similar, but now the teaching is about shelter not food.

Plants have various uses, so the kingdom is seen and reflected in various ways.

Verses 33-34 are difficult to interpret: Jesus speaks many parables for the peoples' limited understanding, but will explain the teaching only to his disciples.

Are the parables simple stories designed to hide the truth rather than to teach it?

A parable doesn't say everything, but induces a person to think and make discoveries, beginning with the experience the listeners have of the seed. This is not a neatly packaged doctrine that arrives all ready to be taught and embellished. The parable does not provide water in a bottle, but rather, leads people to the source. It also has depth. The deeper you penetrate it, the more you discover, and after, there is even more yet to discover and learn from it.

A farmer, listening, would say, "Seed in the ground, I know what that is, but Jesus is saying that this has something to do with the kingdom of God! What could that be?" It's not difficult to imagine the long conversations that might follow with the crowd. The parable moves with the people and gets them to listen to nature and to think about life.
