Resurrection: the tender revolution

We're used to thinking of the resurrection as a moment in time - the moment when Christ who was dead becomes alive. But as we emerge from lockdown, this Easter feels different - it is also a slow dawning of something new.

The coming months invite us to reconnect with friends, family and neighbours, discover new vocations, and re-open ourselves and our parishes to a wounded world. We will rediscover each other 'in the flesh'. This long resurrection will require both care and courage from us all.

Pope Francis talked of 'the revolution of tenderness' in *The Joy of the Gospel* in 2013. His words then prove strangely prophetic today:

The Gospel tells us constantly to run the risk of a face-to-face encounter with others, with their physical presence which challenges us, with their pain and their pleas, with their joy which infects us in our close and continuous interaction.

True faith in the incarnate Son of God is inseparable from self-giving, from membership in the community, from service, from reconciliation with others. The Son of God, by becoming flesh, summoned us to the revolution of tenderness." Evangelii Gaudium, 88

Thoughts from today's Readings: First Reading: Acts 3: 13-15, 17-19

We can time this miracle. It happens at about three o'clock one afternoon, a traditional time for prayer at the Jerusalem Temple. Peter and John have just cured a lame beggar - crippled from birth.

He had asked for money and they said they had none - but would give what they could in the name of Jesus of Nazareth: healing. People are astounded by the sight of a well-known crippled beggar walking and jumping, and run to see what has happened.

Peter takes the opportunity to give his message to fellow Israelites. He is blunt, telling them they share the guilt for the death of Jesus. But he reassures them they did not really understand what they were doing (echoes of Jesus' prayer on the cross) and if they repent they will be forgiven.

We hear Peter's own cowardice, repentance and forgiveness in his speaking.

Gospel: Luke 24: 35-48

The excited opening of today's Gospel reading is the return of the two disciples who had met Jesus on the road to Emmaus earlier in the day.

It is the day of the Resurrection, and all are astounded by reports that Jesus is risen from the dead: the women have said so, Simon has, and now Cleopas and his companion (perhaps one of his sons, James or Matthew, or even his wife, Mary?) have seen him. Suddenly the Lord appears.

Even knowing from the others that he was risen the disciples are still startled, afraid of a ghostly mirage. To reassure them Jesus eats a piece of grilled fish.

He is real. We remember that he ate grilled fish at the side of the Lake (John 21:12) when the apostles had been fishing. The sign of the Eucharist is loaves and fishes, and the fish became a symbol of Christ in the early community. As the disciples settle into the joy of being with Jesus he tells them they are to be his witnesses throughout the world. © Watermead Apostolate
